


Mission

Our mission is to provide specially selected and trained community volunteers, CASAs, to advocate for abused and neglected children in the pursuit of safe and permanent homes.





Dear CASA Friends,

This report reflects the extraordinary work, commitment and leadership by CASA Volunteers, staff and supporters. Our vision is to create a world where every child who has experienced abuse or neglect is given the opportunity to thrive in a safe and loving home.

This year, CASA of Adams & Broomfield Counties supported over 220 volunteers who were screened, trained and appointed by a judge of the court to serve nearly 500 abused or neglected children. A business case study conducted by Patricia Silverstein, President and Chief Economist of Development Research Partners, concluded that the advocacy and support of CASA Volunteers has the impact of reducing lifetime social costs and increasing lifetime earnings of the children served. This not only improves the lives of the children, it also has a positive impact on our community and the business environment.

With the support of the community and our stakeholders, we aspire to recruit, train, and pair 500 much needed volunteers with the 1,100 vulnerable children going it alone in the Adams and Broomfield Counties court system.

We are honored to do this meaningful work alongside you every day and to reach for the common goal of serving every child who needs the compassion and commitment of a CASA Volunteer. Thank you for your tireless commitment – from volunteerism to funding our work – and all you do in support of building a brighter future for our community's abused and neglected children.

A Judge's Sleepless Nights Sparked Creation of the First CASA Program

In 1977, Judge David Soukup, a Seattle juvenile court judge concerned about making drastic decisions with insufficient information, conceived the idea of citizen volunteers speaking up for the best interests of abused and neglected children in the courtroom. From that first program has grown a national network of Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) programs that are recruiting, training and supporting volunteers.

A CASA brings passion along with the gift of time. As volunteers, CASAs have the opportunity to focus on a single family and a single child. CASAs just don't "check-in" on a child, they spend the time needed for a child to know that there is a caring and safe adult in the world. A CASA will spend time to meet with a child's teacher, principal, and counselor. They spend time in court to tell the judge how the child is doing and what we can do better. They take that gift of time from their families and friends, and give it to a stranger's child. We have no way to return that gift. All that we can do is support CASA and say thank you.



Success Stories

Cindy and Ty

In December 2015, CASA Volunteer Advocate Cindy Bruce asked her CASA child, Ty, what he hoped for in the New Year. Ty's wish was simple: a forever family. It was at the same time that Doug and Debbie Anderson sent in their second inquiry about Ty to a local adoption website. "[My husband] was drawn to Ty's picture and his story," Debbie said.

About a week later they got a phone call asking them to come to an event for potential foster parents and foster children. Ty's name was on the list, and the Anderson's knew they were meant to go.

For Cindy, the role of a CASA Volunteer Advocate was a chance to lift a child up, to change his life. "The most rewarding part of being a CASA is knowing that I am making a difference in children's lives," Cindy said. "To know that somebody is there to stand up for them and just to be their friend."

"Helping me to know what's right and what's wrong, it changed a lot," Ty said about Cindy's role as a CASA Volunteer Advocate. "Getting to know that someone is actually there. I think everyone needs a CASA."

Ty visited the Andersons and did a few overnights before he moved in at the end of January 2016. "He fit right in and was very much in favor of getting adopted as quickly as possible," Debbie said.

August 8th was Ty's adoption day. "I was just grateful for Cindy and her help and support through the whole process, including moving the adoption process along" Debbie said.

Amy, Kevin and Tim's Story

At two and three years old, Amy and Tim Nickerson had endured more than their fair share of trauma before finding permanency and happiness. They were put into foster care due to domestic violence at home, but after Tim suffered a traumatic head injury in a foster home and Amy was diagnosed with

Reactive Detachment Disorder, the future was confusing, unsafe and seemingly hopeless for the two. Both children desired a permanent, loving family. Kevin Houck, CASA Volunteer Advocate, helped make that wish come true. For Dwayne and Jennifer, their adoption of Amy and Tim was a story of fate and faith. "I never read the paper, but I happened to read the *Denver Post* front-page article one day about Timmy getting hurt in foster care," Jennifer said. "We had just turned away two prospective adoptive children when Adams County called about Amy and Tim."

The first meeting, the couple visited with the two children for three hours and immediately knew they wanted them to be part of their family. The children were in separate homes at the time, making adopting them both more complicated. Dwayne and Jennifer attended an emergency hearing and wrote a letter to

the judge expressing their desire to adopt both children.

"It was really the CASA and play therapist at the termination trial that made the biggest impact," Jennifer said. "Because the CASA and play therapist

> were so diligent to attain objectivity during the case, the judge honored their voice and allowed us to adopt both Amy and Tim."

For Kevin, this day made the battle fought before, worth it. "Sitting at the children's adoption and just watching them with their new families, and just knowing that after a roller coaster ride of two years, everything was going to be okay for everybody involved," Kevin said. "It was just obvious that everything was going to work out and everything

was worthwhile with all that we did."

Now, Amy, 14, and Tim, 15, are happy in their forever family. "My life now is kind of perfect," Amy said. "We have so many fun times and it's just full of laughter, love and family. My CASA Kevin was my voice throughout the case when I couldn't tell people what I wanted or what I needed. He is truly why I am with the parents I have today."
