Dear Friends of CASA,

This year, we celebrate 25 years of advocacy for children and families in Adams and Broomfield Counties. Since our founding, 1,548 volunteers have stepped forward to serve an incredible 4,963 children. In fiscal year 2025 alone, 187 volunteers advocated for 382 children, providing individualized support that promotes each child's safety, stability, and overall well-being.

This year brought many moments of hope and progress. Most notably, we launched our Family Engagement Program, developed in response to school districts identifying a need for earlier, relationship-based support for youth who are disengaged from school or at risk of truancy filings. In its first year, the program proudly served 24 students and their families, providing vital advocacy aimed at improving academic engagement, preventing court involvement, and linking families to essential community resources.

At the same time, families in our community are experiencing increasingly complex challenges. After several years of decline, dependency and neglect case filings in the 17th Judicial District rose by 30% in fiscal year 2025. **Truancy filings remained high.** Families are navigating issues such as limited access to healthcare and mental health support, and concerns about safety, housing, and financial hardship. These stressors can increase the risk of child abuse, neglect, and chronic absenteeism. As these issues accumulate, the need for CASA's services, and for compassionate, well-trained volunteers, continues to grow.

Federal funds have become less stable in the nonprofit sector, and many long-standing sources of support are increasingly competitive as budget constraints limit philanthropic giving. **These pressures make strong community partnerships more vital than ever.** We are grateful that our community continues to step up for CASA and the children we serve. This year, we hosted our most successful Light of Hope and Indulge for CASA events to date, and our end-of-year campaign reflected the incredible generosity of our community. CASA relies on the continued support of individuals, businesses, foundations, and organizations to ensure every child has the opportunity to thrive in a safe, permanent, and loving home.

As we celebrate 25 years of advocacy, we are filled with gratitude for each volunteer, donor, partner, and friend who has walked alongside us. Together, we have built a legacy of hope and resilience, and together, we will continue ensuring that every child in our community has a trusted advocate by their side.

OVERVIEW OF PROGRAMS

DEPENDENCY & NEGLECT

A CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocate) is a trained volunteer who represents the best interests of children who have experienced abuse and neglect and are currently in the child welfare system, through no fault of their own.

CASA Volunteers ensure that the child's physical, mental, educational, and emotional needs are being met, and advocate for the child in court, all while supporting them in their journey to find a safe and permanent home.

For decades, I was a special education teacher, and I recently retired. Having spent years working with students who struggled with social and emotional challenges, I felt well-prepared to support a truancy case. I've had the chance to get to know my CASA child in a way that goes far beyond academics. At first, she was very shy, but everything began to shift the day she asked me to walk her to school.

Walking her to school wasn't typical CASA practice, but it gave us time to connect. One day, she lit up talking about a graphic novel. I brought her a few books and later sent a birthday gift card. Her mom said she picked out two books to read over the summer. That small moment felt big. It was evidence of trust, of progress, and of a growing spark in her love for learning."

FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

Family Engagement Advocates work one-on-one with families whose children are chronically absent from school. Advocates partner with families to identify and build upon strengths, provide advocacy and mentorship for children, and facilitate resource navigation for families to access wraparound community supports.

This new, prevention-focused program is voluntary for families and operates outside the child welfare and court system. Family Engagement Advocates support students' needs to help them re-engage in school.

OVERVIEW OF PROGRAMS

Currently, I am reconnecting with a few of my former CASA youths, per their requests. I've been doing a little mentoring and helping them process how being a foster kid affected their lives and who they have become as successful adults. With every conversation, they continue to tell me that having me as their CASA completely changed their lives.

I have a difficult time wrapping my head around their words, as I was only doing what I thought was right to advocate for them and act in their best interests. What a blessing it is to continue to speak into their lives as adults! Being a CASA is a lifetime commitment, and what a wonderful way to leave a legacy for those who, through no fault of their own, lived through a situation they had no control of and could not advocate for themselves."

TRUANCY

A Truancy CASA is a trained volunteer who represents the educational interests of a child or youth with a truancy case in the 17th Judicial District.

Truancy CASAs work alongside the child, family, and school to identify barriers to attendance, access community resources, and improve the student's school attendance and academic success.

Being a volunteer has taught me how impactful just one person can be. When students struggle with attendance or get caught up in the court system, they need someone in their corner. They need someone who sees the whole child. Not just academics, but also their medical and emotional needs. Right now, I'm working with a student who has severe special needs. One of the main challenges has been helping him get to school consistently, so I visit in the mornings to support his grandmother with getting him ready and out the door.

Another challenge was getting him connected to medical and dental care. After his grandmother scheduled appointments, we learned that he needed three root canals and multiple crowns. He got the care he needed, and now we're working on addressing his sleep issues too. Having these needs met enables him to better engage in school."














REPRESENTATION MATTERS

We are proud to serve children and families across every race, ethnicity, ability, socioeconomic background, gender identity, sexual orientation, religion, and zip code. Yet, statistics show that children of color continue to be disproportionately represented in the child welfare system. Likewise, LGBTQ+ youth, already more likely to face rejection and discrimination from their family, are overrepresented in the foster care system. Children with developmental disabilities also face unique challenges, often needing someone who truly understands their perspective to help them navigate barriers and thrive.

Representation matters. That's why we actively engage in community events throughout the year. Showing up, building trust, and ensuring every child and family sees themselves reflected in our mission.

In fiscal year 2024, we achieved **Tier 1 recognition** through the Human Rights Campaign's All Children, All Families Program. A milestone that underscores our commitment to creating an inclusive and affirming environment. We proudly maintained that recognition in fiscal year 2025 and continue to work with HRC and partner agencies nationwide to ensure every youth and family receives the understanding and support they deserve. Every child's story is unique, and every child deserves to feel seen, valued, and supported as they work toward a safe and successful future.

When I first saw the CASA table at Broomfield Days in 2019, I knew it was where I wanted to serve. But my oldest son was struggling with his second bout of cancer, and I wanted to give my all to any child I served. In 2021, when I saw the table again and my son was stable, I knew I had to sign up.

I remember during my interview telling the Advocate Supervisor that the children I most wanted to serve were those with disabilities. I felt they are likely the most underserved in a system of already underserved children. You see, not only did my son have cancer, he also has Down syndrome.



He is now 22, and I have walked through all things related to educational and medical advocacy. I wanted to use that knowledge to help children and families struggling in those areas. Since being sworn in, I have served on five cases with nine children, and all have included a child with an intellectual or learning disability. I have always felt that if I cannot use the struggles that I have faced to help others, then what was the point? What better way to use the pain than for this fantastic purpose?"



WHEN A CASA BECOMES FAMILY

At this year's Light of Hope event, we were honored to share the story of Jason, a young man who aged out of the foster care system into adulthood. Through years of uncertainty, his CASA Volunteer, Jan remained the steady presence he could always count on.





"I was sworn in as a CASA Advocate by Judge Delgado in 2018 and have since served on five cases. Jason was my second and longest case, I supported him from 2018 until his case closed in 2023. We chose not to continue into his Youth in Transition case so he could become part of my family instead.

He's now like a grandson to me. I attended his high school graduation and visited him at college, and he's spent holidays with our family. Even joined in our Christmas nerf gun battles with a huge grin on his face.

Along with serving as an Advocate, I'm also a Peer Coordinator supporting four other volunteers. I'll always keep a case of my own because being a CASA has truly been one of the most rewarding experiences of my life."
